

Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

Heritage Weekend



It is a real delight to open up our beautiful building at All Saints on Saturday and Sunday for Heritage Weekend. We hope to welcome many into our building, and our very own Relf Clark will be giving an Organ Recital on Saturday afternoon at 2.30.

Saturday is also the annual "Ride+Stride" event, promoted by the Berkshire Historic Churches Trust - partly to raise money to help maintain the beautiful churches across Berkshire, but also to encourage us to visit local churches to appreciate them as buildings and to see and be encouraged by what they are offering and doing as church communities.

Seen from the surrounding roads, a church building such as All Saints is a tangible and visible witness to the local community of the way in which the Christian faith has been, and continues to be, held and celebrated in our land; a reminder for those with eyes to see of the presence of

Christ in our daily lives and of the loving care of God for his whole creation, our own local community included.

Inside, it becomes a place of prayer and worship, a place of encounter with the living God who created us and sustains us, who redeems us and brings us the hope of eternal life. Here, we find the symbols of our faith -Mary and the saints, the cross, the sculpted tableau of the Resurrection on the West wall, the Paschal Candle telling of the presence of the Risen Lord with his people. Here, we find the places where God gives himself to us, in baptism at the font and in the Eucharist at the Altar. And the beautiful stained glass tells the story of our redemption in Christ, from his birth at Bethlehem to his Resurrection and Ascension. A colourful storybook of our faith.

Generations of people have encountered God in the stillness of our church building, countless people have been transformed through the power of the Eucharist; and God has come to meet them in the simple tokens of water, bread and wine. The story of salvation has been told and re-told, especially through the great celebrations of Christmas, Holy Wek and Easter, the Ascension and Pentecost, and we pray that as we do that year by year we will each one of us be transformed into the people God calls us to be. And we remember in our prayers those who have gone before us, those whose faith and commitment have kept the light of the Gospel shining bright in this place.

So when we celebrate the Heritage of our church building, we celebrate not just its physical beauty but the beauty of lives transformed and communities blessed; we celebrate not just the faith and commitment of past generations, but the faith and commitment to God of this present generation of worshippers; we celebrate not just the God who we see spoken of in the stained glass, but the God who longs to know and speak with each one of us, personally; we celebrate not just the peace of the church building, but the peace that Christ can bring into our hearts and minds.

So do come and spend some time in our beautiful church, if you are able. Give thanks for all the good things God has done for you, and open yourself to the good things he wants to give you in the future. Give thanks for previous generations of faithful worshippers, and commit yourself anew. And this weekend and into the future, speak with one another of the faith, the grace, and the love that you find here, encourage one another, renew one another, bring joy, hope and healing to one another.

Saturday 1 October South Coast trip to Berwick, in East Sussex. This trip has been arranged with the Revd Peter Blee, vicar of 7 Sussex churches near the South Downs. The trip will focus on Berwick where remarkable work has taken place and will be followed by a walk between Berwick and Alciston which is part of the Cuckmere Pilgrim Path that Peter has created in recent years. We will arrive in Berwick at 11.00am for tea and coffee followed by a talk on Berwick church followed by worship.

Between 1-2pm we will share a pub lunch at the Cricketers in Berwick village. 2-3pm — Pilgrim walk from Berwick to Alciston. 3.00pm Contemplative worship at Berwick followed by tea and depart for Maidenhead at 4.15pm returning home around 6.30pm. There will be a sign-up list at the back of the church in the near future.

Sunday 2 October 10.00am Harvest Festival Eucharist followed by an auction of harvest goods. Following the auction there will be a harvest ploughman's lunch to enjoy.

Sunday 30 October 10.00am Eucharist to celebrate our Patronal Festival of All Saints. Our Associate Archdeacon, The Revd Liz Jackson will be our guest preacher as we give thanks for the marvellous floor restoration work that has taken place. Following the service, we will share hospitality with guests involved in the project. Following the drinks at the back of the church there will be a church community meal at the Gandhi Restaurant at 12.30. Again, we will ask people to sign a list at the back of church if they wish to share in the meal.

Sunday 20 November 10.00am Confirmation here with Bishop Olivia who will be baptising and confirming both children and adults. She will also present the Bronze Eco-Church award to the congregation.

Sunday 27 November Advent Sunday 12 noon to 3.30pm – The Christ Child Market in the Quadrangle. The Salvation Army Band are booked to play carols sharing the Christmas story from 3.00pm. We do need a few more people on the planning group and will require a good number of volunteers on the day to look after the stalls.

Fr John will also be leading a Bible Study in the Autumn as well as leading a Pilgrimage to Walsingham from Tuesday 20 September to Friday 23 September. This will be the first Pilgrimage from All Saints since 2018 to the place where so many of us have enjoyed services of deep spiritual meaning and wonderful hospitality.

The organ at All Saints', Boyne Hill is among the finest in Berkshire. It was built in 1931 by Harrison & Harrison of Durham and thus belongs to the period that produced such famous examples of their work as the instruments at King's College, Cambridge (1934) and Westminster Abbey (1937). Although it contains material re-cycled from the organ that J.W. Walker built at All Saints' in 1879, it is an entirely characteristic example of the company's inter-war work. It was dedicated by the Bishop of Oxford, the Rt Revd Thomas Strong, on 28 June 1931, when the inaugural recital was given by Dr Henry G. Ley, the then Precentor of Eton College. The organ has three manuals and pedals, twenty-five speaking stops and the usual complement of couplers and aids to registration. In 2003 it was restored by Richard Bower, re-dedicated by the Bishop of Oxford, the Rt Revd Richard Harries, and reopened with a recital given by the international virtuoso Thomas Trotter. The work of restoration involved the conversion of the mechanism from tubular-pneumatic to electropneumatic, but tonally the organ remains the instrument voiced by, or under the direction of, Arthur Harrison in 1931, and it retains such period features as the leathered Open Diapason on the Great, the powerful chorus reeds on the Swell, and the titanic open wood basses. Mark Venning, the present Chairman of Harrison & Harrison Ltd, summed it up when he wrote that the All Saints' organ 'shows all the subtlety and eloquence of this particular style [of organ-building] in its grandest maturity'.

Harrison & Harrison have been building organs since 1861 and doing so in Durham since 1872. They are the largest firm of organ-builders in the UK. Their recent projects included the organs at Canterbury Cathedral, Salisbury Cathedral and York Minster. Their current ones include the organs at Norwich Cathedral and Liverpool Metropolitan Cathedral. Further information can be had from the company's website.

Relf Clark has assisted at All Saints' since 1985 and is the author of the history of the organs and organists on sale in the church. After tuition with Dr Sidney Campbell at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle he won an exhibition to Oxford, where he studied with Robert Sherlaw Johnson and F.W. Sternfeld and assisted at the University Church. At the age of twenty, while still an undergraduate, he became a prize-winning Fellow of the Royal College of Organists, and he completed his musical education at London University, where he read musicology, and Reading University, where he studied with David Sanger and gained both a distinction in performance studies and the degree of PhD.

Dr Clark writes and lectures on music and has contributed to *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians*, *The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography*, and musical periodicals of various kinds. From 1990 to 2005 he was a member of the council of the British Institute of Organ Studies, and for seven of those years he was the BIOS publications officer. He is an honorary life member of the Elgar Society, having been one of its officers for twelve years; his publications include four volumes of Elgar-related essays; and he appears in the Durham University DVD about Elgar's Sonata for Organ, Op.28. He composes for the organ and has given recitals in many parts of the UK.

In 1982, after attending what is now the University of Law, Relf Clark qualified as a solicitor, and in 1993, after a decade as an in-house lawyer with Costain Group plc, he returned to private practice. From 1998 until his retirement in 2017 he practised with a law firm in the City of London, where his clients included the Royal Society of Musicians of Great Britain, of which he is now an honorary life member.
