Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

This weekend, the Sundays@6 service will be a celebration of the Eucharist of wholeness and healing. This simple service provides an opportunity for people to pray for healing in their lives and to pray that God's loving and healing presence may enter the life of one they love and care about.

Just before journeying to Kenya in November 2013, I went into our church and took with me the oil for anointing the sick and my 'Pocket Ritual' a rite of anointing and caring for the sick. I had spent much time in preparation talking to the late and much-loved Revd Roy Taylor about being prepared with sermons that could be used at a moment's notice in the Diocese of Taita Taveta but it was to be this small book and oil for anointing that would provide profound moments during that trip to Kenya.

The Christian Faith reminds us that we are all united in the bond of common baptism and a common faith within the Body of Christ. What happens to one member affects us all. When the priest anoints the sick, he/she is anointing in the name and with the power of Christ himself on behalf of the community. The message of hope is for the sick, but it is also necessary for those for those who are near and dear to the person in pain and facing great trial.

During that trip to Kenya, I was invited to pray with people who were sick. We would sing a hymn like amazing grace and recall the words of St James; 'Is there anyone sick among you? Let her call for the elders and let them pray for her and anoint her in the name of the Lord. This prayer, made in faith, will save the sick person. The Lord will restore health, and if any sin has been committed, they will be forgiven.'

People would then be anointed on the forehead, 'through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit'. Then with open hands the person seeking healing hears the words, 'May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up'.

This short service in people homes across that Diocese was a moving experience and is replicated many times in homes in our parish, at hospital beds and at church. The title of our service though is wholeness and healing, and this leads me to think about what wholeness might mean.

This week I am meeting with curates from Slough, Reading and Windsor reflecting on what flourishing in ministry and together in Church Leadership might mean. How can we flourish individually and as the Body of Christ? The church is called to model a community where all can find fulfilment and wholeness to use our gifts. This will mean looking after our own wellbeing and providing an environment where people can flourish together in a safe and encouraging environment.

On an individual level what provides your own wellbeing? Joining a rambling group, watching Leyton Orient play football, curling up with a good book, spending time with family or watching your favourite film for the fifth time? There are many tools available to help us assess our wellbeing in the following areas.

Physical self-care eg – Do I eat a good diet and get regular exercise, get enough sleep, take the occasional holiday or short break?

Psychological self-care eg – Read books that are unrelated to our work, make time for quiet reflection, notice your inner experiences.

Emotional self-care eg – spend time in the company of people you enjoy, find things that make you laugh, identify comforting activities, express your care for social action in letters, donations.

Spiritual self-care eg – spend time with nature, be aware of the non-material aspects of life, pray, sing, experience those moments of awe, contribute to causes that you believe in and listen to things that inspire you. Perhaps take part in a quiet day or retreat.

Workplace eg Try to take breaks during the day and balance workload. A challenge is seeking to find a balance in work, family life, relationships, play and rest.

Our community should hopefully have a culture where we treat each other with respect and dignity, free from harassment or intimidation with no discriminatory behaviours where people can flourish in a safe and loving environment. At the morning Eucharist when we reflect on the theme of Safeguarding, we will seek to discover what it means to love God and our neighbour as ourselves.

Please do come and worship at our morning Eucharist for Safe communities and/or our Wholeness and Healing Eucharist at our Sundays@6.
